

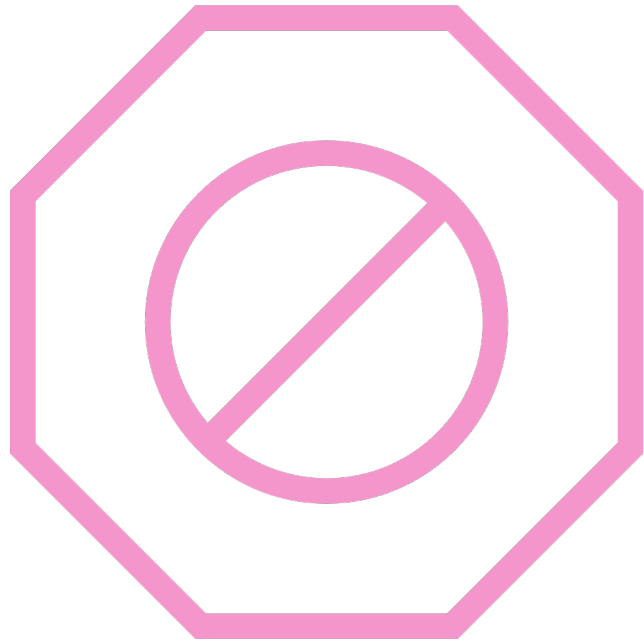


Suspension Orders

What is a suspension order?

A suspension order stops you from working in a particular role.

It can last for up to two years.

When the suspension order ends, you can return to your role, unless another hearing is arranged.

When might a suspension order be imposed?

It may be imposed where:

- There is a real risk of harm to those who use the services or the wider public, or a serious breach of the Codes or Practice
- Your impairment can be addressed during the period of suspension
- You have shown insight
- There are no serious concerns about your values

Effects of a suspension order



A suspension order can have serious financial implications as you will not be able to work in a particular role whilst it is imposed.



It will remain on your record of registration with the SSSC.
