Who are the SSSC?

- The Scottish Social Services Council (SSSC) are the regulators of social service workers, social workers and social work students in Scotland.
- It is a non-governmental public body.



What do the SSSC do?



Their purpose is to protect the public by registering workers, setting standards for their conduct, training and educating, as well as supporting professional development.



If workers do not meet the standards of practice and conduct, then the SSSC can investigate and act.

What are the Codes of Practice?

- The Codes of Practice for Social Service Workers and Employers explains the standards of practice and behaviour expected of everyone who works in social services in Scotland.
- It also explains the standards expected of employers of social service workers in Scotland.
